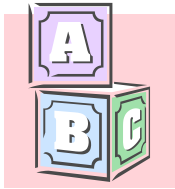


## REMEMBER!

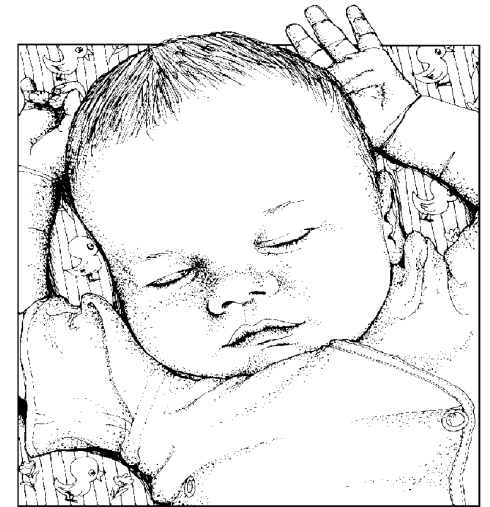

If you live in Barbour, Chambers, Lee, Macon, or Russell Counties, the Small Wonders Maternity Care Program can help you get the care you need.

## GET THE CARE YOU NEED FROM THE SMALL WONDERS MATERNITY CARE PROGRAM!

The Small Wonders Maternity Care Program is set up to give quality care for pregnant women who live in Barbour, Chambers, Lee, Macon, and Russell counties.

The Small Wonders Maternity Care Program will help you get the care you need to have a healthy pregnancy. You must get your care from the Small Wonders Maternity Program in order for Medicaid to pay for your prenatal care and delivery.

The Small Wonders Maternity Care Program offers:

- Prenatal Care from someone you choose
- High risk care (if you have a medical need for it)
- Help with any problems you have that could keep you from having a healthy baby
- Classes about having a baby and how to be a good parent
- Delivery of your baby
- Hospital care when you have your baby
- Care for you after you have your baby including birth control

## WHAT YOU NEED TO DO:

Call to find a doctor or clinic so that you can set up a time for your first check-up. Going for care during the first three months you are pregnant is best for you and your baby.

After you choose a doctor or clinic for your care and delivery, you will meet your Care Coordinator. She will help you while you are pregnant and up to 60 days after you deliver your baby.

You need to meet with your Care Coordinator at least one time while you are pregnant and one time after you deliver. She will give you information about what you need to do to have a healthy pregnancy and how to take good care of your new baby.



## CHOOSING YOUR DOCTOR OR CLINIC:

When you come for your first visit, you will be shown a list of the doctors and clinics that take care of women in Barbour, Chambers, Lee, Macon, and Russell counties. You will choose a doctor or clinic to give you prenatal care and deliver your baby. This is an important decision!

Here are some things to think about:

- Does this doctor or clinic deliver babies at the hospital I want to use? Some doctors only deliver at one hospital. Be sure that the doctor/clinic you want to use delivers at the hospital you want to use.
- Is this doctor's office or clinic close to my home? You will need to make 12 to 14 visits before your baby is born. Pick a doctor or clinic that you can drive to or get a ride to without a problem.
- Does this doctor have other people who will help with my care? Many doctors have qualified people who help them give prenatal care. For example, you may see a nurse with special training for some of your check-ups.
- Who will actually deliver my baby? Doctors usually have other qualified people "on call" to deliver babies if they cannot come. Be sure you know who is "on-call" for your doctor or clinic.
